Methodology

- Methodology:** This online survey was conducted by Pollara Strategic Insights with a sample of 4,044 adult Canadians. This is the fourth annual survey in CAMIMH’s Mental Health and Substance Use Health Report Card Tracker. The first survey was conducted in March 2023; however, it used a different series of questions that does not lend itself to a comparison to the question that were asked from 2024-2026. The study information, as well as the provincial base sizes are listed below.
- Weighting:** National results have been weighted by the most current census data in terms of gender, age, & region to ensure the total sample is representative of the population as a whole.

Methodology – cont'd

- **Grade Scoring:** Each question is rated on a 10-point scale, with 1 indicating the lowest rating and 10 indicating the highest. Category scores reflect the average rating of all statements within that category, while the overall score represents the average of the four category scores.
- **Grades:** The letter grades represent the following scores:

Letter Grade	Score
A+	9.0 - 10
A	8.0 – 8.9
B	7.0 – 7.9
C	6.0 – 6.9
D	5.0 – 5.9
F	1.0 – 4.9

- **Access Scores:** These are the average scores among those who have accessed mental health services (for mental health attributes) or substance use services (for substance use health attributes) in the past 12 months.

Methodology – cont'd

Measuring Alcohol Use

- **The Alcohol Use Disorders Identification Test (AUDIT)** is used in this report to explore drinking patterns and behaviours, assessing alcohol intake, consequences as a result of alcohol consumption, and potential for dependence. This screener is validated for use in self-reported contexts.
- Scores on this 10-item questionnaire range between 0 and 40, with scores higher than 15 indicating dependent behaviours.

Measuring Cannabis Use

- **The Cannabis Use Disorder Test (CUDIT-r)** is used in this report to identify individuals who have been using cannabis in harmful or problematic ways in the last six months. This screener is validated for use in self-reported contexts
- Scores on this 8-item questionnaire range between 0 to 31, with scores above 12 indicating dependent behaviours.

Overview of Federal-Provincial Mental Health System Grades



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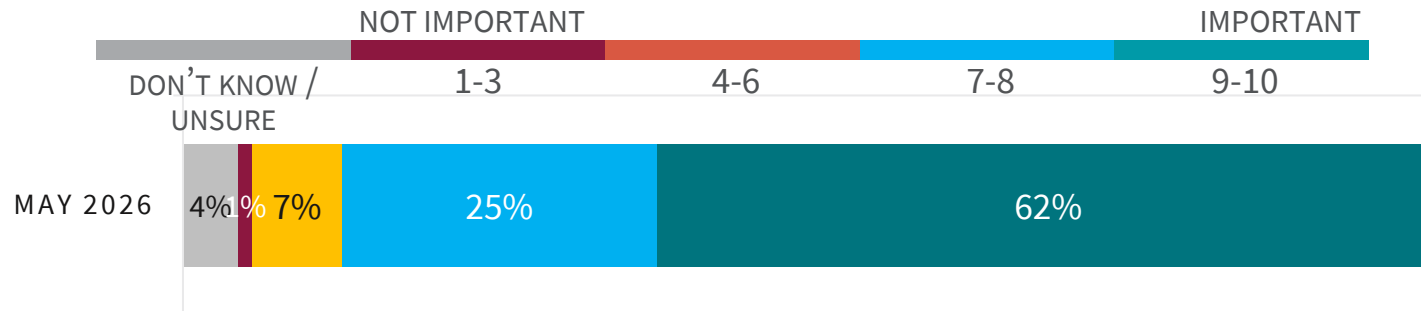


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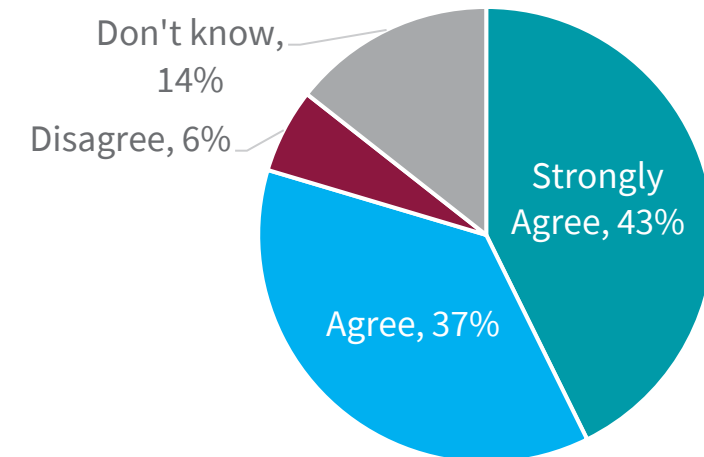
Access to mental health care services and providers is important

- Almost nine-in-ten (87%) of Canadians consider timely access to mental health care services to be important, with almost two-thirds saying this is very important (62% rating it 9-10).
- Four-fifths (80%) agree that provincial governments should hire more mental health care providers to improve access to care, with 43% agreeing strongly and only 6% disagreeing.

Key Findings: Federal and Provincial governments continue to fail Canadians when it comes to mental health care services

- Overall, Canada's "Total Mental Health Score" across the four categories of Access, Public Confidence, Satisfaction and Effectiveness is **F**, with three provinces reverting back to F (2025) from D (British Columbia, Manitoba and Ontario)
- **84%** of the ratings fall into the category of **F**, and **16%** as **D**. Of the 11 grades that changed year-over-year, only 1 improved from F to D, the others went from D to **F**. There are no ratings in the A, B or C range
- In 8 out of 9 provinces, Canadians gave the federal government an **F** in focusing on improving access to mental health care services for all
- Across-the-board, all provinces received an **F** for :
 - Current wait times to access publicly-funded mental health care services
 - Providing similar/equal access to mental health services compared to physical health care
 - Governments are doing enough to evaluate if mental health care services are working
- 1 province (Newfoundland and Labrador) received **Fs** across all categories
- The one category where provinces received a majority of **Ds** (6) was when Canadians were asked about the confidence that you would be able to find the mental health care service(s) you need in a timely manner



Key Findings: Federal and Provincial governments continue to fail Canadians when it comes to mental health care services – cont'd

- Those who had accessed mental health services in the past year did not feel more positively about them. While public confidence received a **D**, all other factors were rated as an **F**
- Younger Canadians 18-34, and males, provide a slightly higher rating (**D**) across all four categories of Access, Public Confidence, Satisfaction and Effectiveness. However, ratings across three categories have declined for those 35 and older
- Visible minorities provide a higher rating (**D**) across all four categories of Access, Public Confidence, Satisfaction and Effectiveness
- 2SLGBTQ+ communities provide a lower rating (**F**) across all four categories of Access, Public Confidence, Satisfaction and Effectiveness
- Those with an alcohol dependency score mental health care services higher (**D/C**) across all four categories of Access, Public Confidence, Satisfaction and Effectiveness
- Those with a cannabis disorder score most mental health care services higher (**D**) across all four categories of Access, Public Confidence, Satisfaction and Effectiveness

Overview of Federal-Provincial Substance Use Health System Grades



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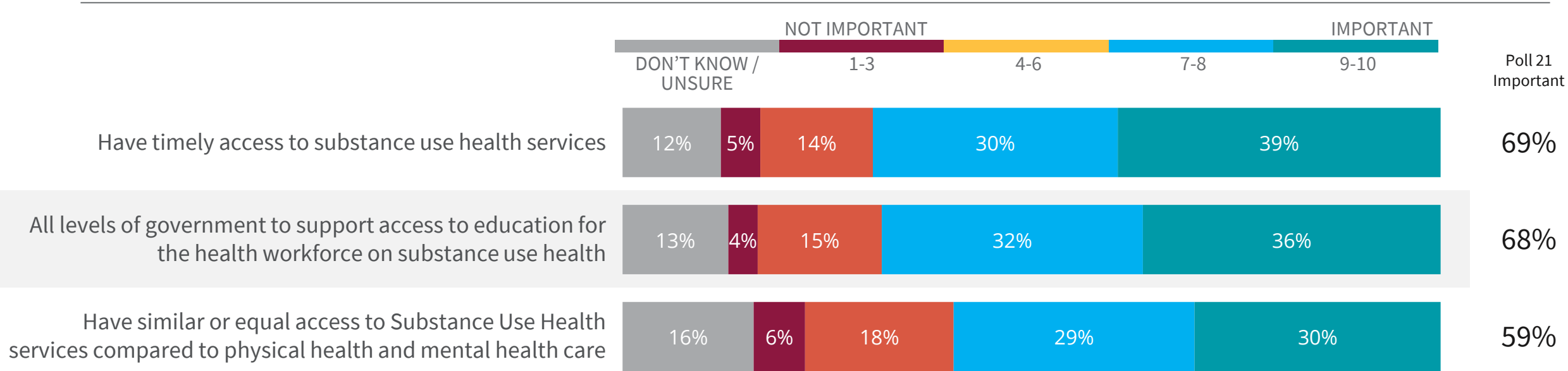


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Access to substance use health care services is important to Canadians

- More than two-thirds (69%) of Canadians believe it is important to have access to timely substance use health services, with 39% finding this to be very important.
- A similar proportion (68%) believes it is important for government to support access to education for the health workforce on substance use health.
- Three-fifths (59%) of Canadians believe access to substance use health services should be similar or equal to access to physical or mental health services.

Key Findings: Federal and Provincial governments continue to receive poor or failing grades for substance use health services

- Overall, Canada's "Total Substance Use Health Score" across the four categories of Access, Public Confidence, Satisfaction and Effectiveness is **D**, with 2 provinces receiving an **F** grade (Newfoundland and Labrador and Nova Scotia)
- British Columbia was the only province that received **Ds** in all categories
- **60%** of the ratings fall into the category of **D**, 37% **F**, and 3% **C**. Of the 23 grades that changed year-over-year, 15 went from D to **F**, the other went from F to **D**. There are no ratings in the A or B category
- Provincially, there were some differences:
 - In Newfoundland & Labrador, the satisfaction scores increased from F to **D**
 - In New Brunswick the access, satisfaction, and overall scores are up to **D** from F
 - In Nova Scotia, the access and satisfaction scores declined to **F** from D
 - In Quebec and Ontario, the satisfaction scores moved to an **F** while the overall score remains a **D**
 - In Ontario and Manitoba, the effectiveness scores moved from a D to an **F**
- Those who have used substance use health services feel more positively about them, give them a **C** grade overall



Key Findings: Federal and Provincial governments continue to receive poor or failing grades for substance use health services – cont'd

- Canadians under 35 years of age, and males, feel more positively across all four categories of Access, Public Confidence, Satisfaction and Effectiveness
- Compared to the overall scores, visible minorities provide slightly higher ratings of Ds for substance use health services across all four categories of Access, Public Confidence, Satisfaction and Effectiveness
- Compared to the overall scores, 2SLGBTQ+ communities feel less positively about substance use health services with ratings of Fs and Ds across all four categories of Access, Public Confidence, Satisfaction and Effectiveness
- Compared to the overall scores, those with an alcohol dependency feel more positively about substance use health services with ratings of Cs and Ds across all four categories of Access, Public Confidence, Satisfaction and Effectiveness
- Compared to the overall scores, those with a cannabis dependency feel more positively about substance use health services with ratings of Cs and Ds across the categories of Access and Public Confidence
